In this annual report you will find information on the many accomplishments and achievements realized during the 2017-2018 fiscal year at Methodist Children's Home (MCH).

MCH serves more than 6,000 children annually, at little or no cost to families. Individual gifts, endowed funds and prudent management allow us to meet our annual needs and offer hope to children, youth and families through a nurturing, Christian community. It has been a privilege for MCH to garner the unwavering support of so many generous benefactors who believe in this ministry and collectively provide the necessary funding to serve these children and families.

This annual report is especially poignant to me for the fact that I have decided to retire on June 30, 2019. I announced this to the Board of Directors and the MCH family early in January after much thought, prayer and discussion with my family.

I share this news with a grateful heart, a sense of peace and the satisfaction of seeing so many young lives change for the better, families reunite, and staff members serve, flourish and grow professionally and personally.

I was blessed to begin my career at MCH as a home parent, and I am equally blessed to be ending it as the 10th President of this ministry. I am proud to leave MCH with confidence in our outstanding employees and Board of Directors, who are committed to the vision and goals in our strategic plan.

MCH remains committed to our mission as a Christian ministry and to evidence-based practices and trauma-informed care through our partnership with the Institute of Child Development at Texas Christian University. We continue to accomplish the goals of our Waco campus master plan with the construction of new homes that provide greater safety and security for children, and the MCH Boys Ranch which enhances our ability to reach youth through vocational training and animal therapy.

We have increased our Family Outreach offices to 13 locations across Texas and New Mexico to provide in-home preventive services that enable families to care for their children in their own homes. Youth now have the opportunity for numerous educational resources, including our partnership with the University of Texas—University Charter School, transition services, after care, and college or vocational education. I am proud of our full continuum of care that provides normalcy for children through all of our programs and services.

Thank you for the support and confidence you have shown me and this awesome ministry that offers hope to so many who desperately need it. The future is bright for Methodist Children's Home!





EDUCATION

MCH is committed to meeting the individual educational needs of residents. Most youth who live on the Waco campus and Boys Ranch attend the University of Texas Charter School on the Waco campus, while others attend Waco public schools. Childcare and school staff work together to determine the most appropriate educational plan for residents. MCH transition services staff works with high school students to help prepare them for college, a job training program or employment.

Youth at all campuses participate in a variety of activities, including competitive sports, leadership organizations, academic competitions, agricultural sciences, recreational activities and community service.



CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

BUILDING HOPE

Our vision is becoming a reality. After completing a fouryear campaign planning study in fall 2015, we launched our campaign: Building Hope. Phase One began with the construction of our first home, the Daniels Home, and included two additional homes, the Ashcraft Home and the Hilliard Home. Phase One and Two have been raised (we have completed the demolition of the West and Scharbauer-Thomas homes and the construction of two additional homes in Phase One). The funding for Phase Two is also completed. The Bowen Home and the Greathouse Home will be built at the site of the Williams-Craig and Bridwell homes, which have been demolished. We have launched Phase Three of our campaign which consists of three new homes.

Our longterm vision is to build 11 new homes on the Waco campus. Once we reach our Phase Three goal, we will continue to build additional homes as funds are available. At this time, the final phase, Phase Four, consists of the last three homes. The estimated cost for all the phases (Phase One-Phase Four, with campaign costs) is \$23,720,000.
